



Known for its many acacia species (wattles) and diversity of wildflowers, the shire is a popular destination during the peak flowering season.

Whether it's the wide open spaces, the chance to escape the hectic pace of city life, tracing family ancestry, or the wildflower viewing opportunities that bring visitors to the shire, it is often the friendliness of the locals and the relaxed country vibe that entice them to stay.

An easy drive north east of Perth, the Shire of Dalwallinu includes 7,235 square kilometres of predominantly agricultural land.

Early inhabitants of this land included various semi-nomadic aboriginal tribes, whom were followed in the 1860's by the Benedictine monks of New Norcia shepherding their sheep through the district.

During the early 1900's land was released by the government in 1000 acre blocks and this was the beginning of the highly productive farming area that the shire has become. Underlying the tapestry of the current farm lands, is the blood, sweat, tears, tales and extraordinary resilience of the districts pioneers.
