Electric Vehicle Charging Station Fully Funded by the Shire of Dalwallinu

There are many benefits from the installation of an EV charging station:

- Ability for EV users to visit the Shire of Dalwallinu in the knowledge they can re-charge and return home
- Ability for users on the charging platform to see the Shire of Dalwallinu as a destination with a re-charge facility
- Ability to include availability of an EV charging station in all of our tourism advertising brochures
- Opportunity to be one of the first northern wheatbelt Shires with an EV station
- Good use of space for the rear of the town hall

Electric vehicles (EV) are rising in popularity, however EV owners are restricted by the distance they can travel without having to re-charge. The distance of Dalwallinu from Perth and other regions (with charging capabilities), currently restricts owners from coming

to Dalwallinu for a day trip or overnight due to lack of public

chargers.

The RAC has installed EV chargers in the south west of WA and Synergy and Western Power have been working with the State Government to create Australia's longest EV charging network.

The network includes the installation of 98 EV charging stations across the state but nowhere near the northern wheatbelt. Whilst the RAC Electric Highway® charging stations have been funded by RAC and are owned and maintained by local governments the EV Station in Dalwallinu is **fully funded** by the Shire of Dalwallinu.

To encourage EV owners to travel to the Shire of Dalwallinu, at the Ordinary Meeting of Council held 20 December 2022, Council resolved to install an Electric Vehicle Charging Station at the rear of the Dalwallinu Town Hall.

The EV charging station will be a DC rapid charging station (between 50-60kW) and capable of re-charging two (2) vehicles at a time if required. The charging station will be accessible via a phone app and a fee will be applicable.

Happy New Year! Hope everyone had a great Christmas and New Year

The construction of the new Multi-Purpose Early Childhood Learning Centre in McNeill Street is going full steam ahead. We are excited to watch the building come together. We are still on track for an end of June handover.

Works were completed on the demolition of the rear of the town hall in December 2022. We are now assessing the quotes for the replacement of the flooring.

At the December Council Meeting, Council resolved to allocate funds for the installation of an Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Station. Whilst Synergy, Western Power and the State Government propose to install 98 EV charging stations across the state, none were planned for the northern wheatbelt. Most EV's can only travel 450-500kms without having to re-charge. This does not make it possible for an EV to travel to Dalwallinu and return to their

home. By installing an EV charging station, this provides the ability for travellers to visit Dalwallinu for a day trip or an overnight stay with them being able to re-charge and return home.

The Annual Corella Cull will be taking place on the weekend of 18 and 19 February 2023 in the Shire.



Doug and Betty Waterhouse

This month's story our story is from Betty Waterhouse. We thank Betty very much for sitting down and sharing hers and Doug's story with us.

Betty Waterhouse (nee Hymus) was born in Fremantle and grew up with 1 sister and 2 brothers, who, unfortunately are all now deceased. Betty grew up in Rockingham, with her father's family being pioneers of the area.

Her father served in WW1, and due to injuries received during his service in France, was mostly confined to a wheelchair. He passed away when Betty was 4 leaving her mother to raise 4 small children on her own. Betty remembers her Mum having lots of help from relatives in Rockingham and from Kelmscott where her mother was from.

Betty attended primary school in Rockingham, where it was close enough to walk. Later she attended Princess May school in Fremantle she would use the bus, before finishing at Perth Modern School where she boarded with friends. Betty was elected prefect at both Princess May and Perth Modern School.

Betty then attended Teachers' College, to train as a teacher, a job that she loved. On completion of teachers' college, Betty and a friend went to Albany and worked in a café while waiting for their teacher appointments. Her friend was appointed to Gwalia for her first school, but Betty and 7 others, who had received very high teaching marks were sent back to university to train as Vocational Officers. Their headquarters were at Perth Boys School. After completion of the course, they were called out to various schools to assess and assist children with specific learning difficulties, mainly reading, and help develop programmes to assist these students. They were also required to do IQ tests on students to better understand the student's needs.


Betty's first teaching post was at Goomalling, which she thoroughly enjoyed, finally having her own class to teach. After two and a half years at Goomalling Betty was approached to become a demonstration teacher, a position she accepted. She went to Claremont School where trainee teachers, as part of their training, would go into her class and watch her present her lesson.

John (Doug) Waterhouse was born in Goomalling. He was the eldest of five children with two brothers and two sisters. His family were farmers at Karranadgin, a small locality just north of Goomalling, and he grew up on the farm. When it was time to start school, as there was no school near the farm at Karranadgin, he went to live with his grandmother and attended Cottesloe Primary School. When the school was eventually built at Karranadgin, he returned and attended this school with his brothers and sisters. Doug also attended Perth Technical College, again staying with his grandparents.

On completion of his schooling, he returned home to the farm near Goomalling. Doug's two sisters



had gone to school in Rockingham with Betty, and when she moved to commence teaching at Goomalling, Doug and Betty met. They married in 1952.

Betty resigned from teaching when she married. Eventually, in later years, she returned to do relief teaching and worked part time from 1970 through to the 1990's. Betty said she was inspired to become a teacher because she didn't enjoy school. Corporal punishment was the norm in those days, and she desperately wanted to become a teacher to inspire children and to make sure that children loved school and wanted to come. Her motto was that a teacher does not have to be a walking encyclopedia, all she must do is inspire a child to want to learn.

She was thrilled when she recently received a Facebook post from one of her ex-students which stated—"When you walked in the classroom at Latham Primary you made learning fun, and we all loved you". That made her day, and she hopes she has made a difference in some children's lives.

Betty and Doug eventually left Goomalling and bought a farm at Maya, between Buntine and Latham, in 1960. By that time, they had three children in Kerry, Peter and Debbie, with the fourth, Megan, born in Dalwallinu after their move to Maya.

When they moved to Maya it was a bustling little community, with 2 shops, tennis club, hall, which hosted church and the church guild, as well as other community events, which Betty was a part of.

Betty and Doug regularly attended and hosted bridge nights with neighbours. Betty and Doug both played tennis at Latham Tennis Club when Maya tennis folded and in later years both played bowls at Buntine Bowling Club.

Doug and Betty worked on the farm from 1960 to 2005, at which time they retired to live in Dalwallinu. They had 4 years together before Doug passed away in 2009. Betty moved into Pioneer House in 2021 and says she is enjoying it there. She loves Dally and says that everything she needs is available here.

Their children have all married and have families of their own. Sadly, her son Peter passed away, but one daughter Kerry lives in Bunbury, another daughter Megan lives in Jurien Bay and Deb is married to a farmer in Dalwallinu. Betty has 13 grandchildren and 25 great grandchildren.

When I asked her what she grew up

with that younger people wouldn't understand today she recalled that traditionally every Sunday they would go to church, then have a roast dinner followed by apple pie and cream, and tea would be cold meat and salad. This was every week, no matter what the temperature was.

Betty has travelled to Singapore and Phuket. She loves cruises and has enjoyed 3 of them as well as enjoying a trip on the Ghan from Darwin to Adelaide. She also has many happy memories of camping trips with family and friends over the years. Betty and Doug also have many happy memories of all their caravan holidays in Jurien Bay. Both enjoyed fishing and Betty loved her 'two swims" a day regardless of the weather.

Betty has always had a passion for gardening, which continues today, as she tends to and enjoys her orchids and geraniums in her small garden at Pioneer House.




Library News & Library on Wheels

Snake bite



IN A MEDICAL EMERGENCY CALL TRIPLE ZERO (000) FOR AN AMBULANCE.

DRSABCD Danger ► Response ► Send for help ► Airway ► Breathing ► CPR ► Defibrillation The DRSABCD Action Plan is the first step when providing first aid. Use this to assess the immediate situation.

All known or suspected snake bites must be treated as potentially life-threatening, and medical aid should be sought urgently.

WARNING

Do not wash venom off the skin or clothes because it may assist identification.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Signs of a snake bite are not always visible and, in some cases, the patient may not have felt anything. Symptoms may not appear for an hour or more after the person has been bitten

Depending on the type of snake, signs and symptoms may include some or all of the following:

- immediate or delayed pain at the bite site
- swelling, bruising or local bleeding
- bite marks (usually on a limb) that may vary from obvious puncture wounds to scratches that may be almost invisible
- swollen and tender glands in the groin or armpit of the bitten limb
- faintness, dizziness
- nausea and vomiting
- headache
- abdominal pain
- oozing of blood from the bite site or gums
- double or blurred vision
- drooping eyelids
- difficulty in speaking or swallowing
- limb weakness or paralysis
- difficulty in breathing
- occasionally, initial collapse or confusion followed by partial or complete recovery.

WHAT TO DO

- 1 Follow DRSABCD.
- 2 Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3 Lie the patient down and ask them to keep still. Reassure the patient.
- 4 If on a limb, apply an elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide) over the bite site as soon as possible.

Apply a further elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide), starting just above the fingers or toes and moving upwards on the bitten limb as far as can be reached.

Use clothing or other material if an elasticised roller bandage is not available.

Apply the bandage as tightly as possible to the limb.

- 5 Immobilise the bandaged limb using splints.
- 6 Keep the patient lying down and completely still (immobilised).
- Write down the time of the bite and when the bandage was applied. If possible, mark the location of the bite site (if known) on the skin with a pen, or photograph the site.
- 8 Stay with the patient until medical aid arrives.








Report It - Public now have the ability to upload photos

The Shire's website now includes the ability to upload photos when using the **Report It** function.

This allows staff to view the incident being reported quickly and make decisions based on evidence provided, rather than having to visit the site for an assessment prior to issuing Works Orders.

Please log on to the website and follow the links to the page and upload your photo at the end.





Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a bushfire start.

They provide important information so you can take action to protect yourself and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of a bushfire. You need to understand the Fire Danger Rating to assess your level of bushfire risk and decide what actions to take.

The new Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) levels are:

Moderate: Plan and Prepare.

Most fires can be controlled.

Stay up to date and be alert for fires in your area.

High: Be ready to act.

Fires can be dangerous.

Decide what you will do if a fire starts.

If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, plan to leave early.

Extreme: Take action now to protect your life and property.

Fires will spread quickly and be extremely dangerous.

Put your bushfire plan into action.

If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, plan to leave early.

Catastrophic: For your survival, leave the bushfire risk areas.

These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire. Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions and if a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost. Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.

Where there is minimal risk, Fire Danger Ratings will be set to 'No Rating".

On these days you still need to remain alert and abide by local seasonal laws and regulations.
